

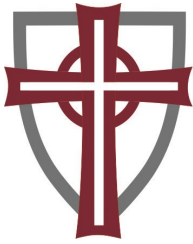

To know Christ and make Him known.

SAINT LUKE'S VISION

What does our Mission and Vision mean?

- ◆ **"We are a family of believers"** The implication is that we are more than simply members of a club where we go to church and "punch our ticket." We are meant to be, and many already feel that they are, part of a close knit community who know each other, love each other, care for each other, support and encourage each other; sometimes hold each other accountable, but are always there, just like a family is meant to be. And, this family/community is because we are a part of the Body of Christ, His Church, that we believe in Jesus as our Savior, our Lord; and our love for others as family is born from our love for Him.
- ◆ **"Growing in the love of Jesus"** How do we do that? First, by giving ourselves to Him wholly and completely; humbly emptying ourselves so that we might be filled with Him by His Holy Spirit. That we continue to grow by seeking to worship Him; that we come to know Him more by spending time in His Word daily and in discipleship classes with others. That we seek Him even as we pray to Him, alone and with others. We also grow as we serve, giving ourselves away and watching Him use us and work through us.

- ◆ **"Sharing the joy of worship"** is part of not only "keeping the Sabbath holy," but also a weekly source of encouragement and reminder of Who He is, what He has done for us, and sharing that with the people we love. That is where the joy is found.
- ◆ **"Serving our community and beyond"** Jesus, as He went to the Upper Room with His apostles the night before He died, began His time with them by washing their feet. When He finished, He taught and reminded them that He didn't come to be served but to serve. When we talk about following Jesus and being a Christian, we sometimes forget that, "He came to serve" and that is the call on our lives. If we are believers in Jesus, we have the Holy Spirit; if we have the Holy Spirit, we have at least one gift of the Spirit (I Corinthians 12; Romans 12; Ephesians 4), and we are called to use our gift, for our good and the good of the Body, locally, regionally, and globally. The apostles were called, and eventually sent on mission, "to Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Some are called to serve overseas, but all of us are called to be His missionaries wherever we are: to be His witnesses; and, to serve Him and others.

What does Saint Luke's Anglican believe?

- ◆ Saint Luke's Anglican church is a member of the Anglican Diocese of South Carolina and the Anglican Church of North America, and as such, we share the same beliefs.
- ◆ As Anglicans, we also subscribe to the 39 Articles and worship according to the Anglican Book of Common Prayer (2019).
- ◆ In addition, Saint Luke's Anglican holds to the Jerusalem Declaration of 2008 as well as the recent Kigali Commitment from GAFCON 2023.

Acolyte Ministry

- The **Acolyte Ministry** recruits, trains, supports and schedules Acolytes to assist the Clergy at our Holy Communion services on Sundays, as well as at Christmas and Holy Week services.
- Students of Middle and High School age are eligible to serve as Acolytes. Some of the Acolyte duties are: carrying the processional Cross, lighting and extinguishing the altar candles, collecting the offertory plates, and assisting the Celebrant in preparing the Communion table.
- **Time Commitment:** Acolytes are required to train at least once a year. They are responsible for making their own schedule changes and to be at church fifteen (15) minutes ahead of the scheduled services. Most acolytes serve until their Senior year of High School.

ACTS Counseling Ministry

- Established in 1996 as an outreach of Saint Luke's to provide professional Christian counseling to all those who are hurting within the body of Christ and as an outreach to the greater Hilton Head and Bluffton community. All are welcome regardless of their faith background or ability to pay. We're blessed to have a Scholarship Fund due to the generosity of our church and The Church Mouse.

Allendale Prison Ministry

- The mission of the Saint Luke's volunteers, approved by the administration and under the direction of the Warden, is to reduce recidivism by using programs that provide rehabilitation through addiction recovery, educational and spiritual opportunities, and vocational training.
- The programs change the character of the inmates through a statistically proven method that offers a new way of life, equipping the men with social skills that eliminate the "prison culture" and instead develop character traits necessary to be successful upon re-entry into their communities.
- There are many programs available for volunteers to join and teach, including Addiction Recovery, Book Club, Bible Study, Jumpstart Ministries, Kairos Ministries, Beekeeping, Sustainable Living, CDL, Construction Small Business, Horticulture, Quilting and Sewing, Art 4

Hope, and many more. This is just a few and there is always a need for new programs.

- **Time Commitment:** Most volunteers start with a, “come and see” position. Once at Allendale, volunteers are often “hooked” and commitments can be once a month, once a week or whatever suits their schedule and for how ever long their willing to help serve and change men’s lives.

Altar Guild/Brass Polishing

- Members of the Altar Guild are responsible for: the set-up of communion for the Wednesday morning service and for Sunday morning services Sunday; for the care and cleaning of the communion vessels, altar linens and frontals; assembling the Lay Eucharistic Ministry (LEM) communion kits; and for straightening the books in the pews each week.
- An Altar Guild member is (ideally) part of a 4 or 5 person team who works together, sharing weekly duties. Volunteers rotate weekly and if someone is unable to serve during their scheduled time, they’re asked to find a substitute.
- Members also:
 - Set-up communion (if requested) at weddings and funerals/ memorial services
 - Assist with monthly/periodic brass polishing, including the candlesticks, processional cross, candle torches, offering plates and missal stand. Sometimes “brass polishing parties” are held to get the work accomplished.
- **Time Commitment:** Ideally the Altar Guild has 4 teams of 4 or more people, making commitment approximately one Sunday per month. (The more teams/volunteers available, the less frequent the commitment). Set-up before the services generally takes about 15-20 minutes and the same for take-down afterward.

Being Men of Christ (BMOC)

- Being Men of Christ (BMOC) is open to all men of Saint Luke’s Anglican and their guests. BMOC’s objective is to enrich the lives of men at Saint Luke’s through regular social contact, sharing faith journeys, breaking bread together, and other activities of interest. BMOC provides an excellent way for men to get to know one another and encourages them to become more active members of the congrega-

tion, which is a vital need for the health of our church.

- Getting connected mainly involves attending the regular BMOG monthly dinners, which offers the opportunity to socialize with other men and to hear about the faith journeys of the speakers. Dinners are held nine months a year. In addition, the flagship BMOG event of the year is its annual Christmas dinner and Preschool fundraiser
- **Time Commitment:** For most men, the time commitment is attending dinners—two and a half hours (schedule permitting). However, BMOG is always looking for men who are interested in helping guide the organization on the Board of Directors. The Board meets regularly to review our shared time together and to solicit new speakers and ideas for future dinners and activities.

Bookshop Ministry

- The Bookshop is staffed by Saint Luke’s volunteers who share their time and talents and are passionate about offering a quality selection of readings and gifts for the Saint Luke’s community.
- The Bookshop carries wonderful Christian literature, devotionals, children’s books, Bibles, the ACNA 2019 Book of Common Prayer, and more.
- The mission of the Saint Luke’s Bookstore is to provide a nurturing, and inspiring environment that supports individuals on their faith journey, and is a haven where individuals can explore their faith.
- The Bookshop also offers Saint Luke’s Anglican branded promotional items for personal use or for gifts.
- **Time Commitment:** A few hours a month, both before and after the 10:30 AM service.

Children and Family Ministry

- The Saint Luke’s Children & Family Ministry (CFM) provides discipleship, fellowship, and outreach opportunities for children from infants through 5th grade.
- Children’s Sunday School happens every week from 9:30–10:15 AM in the Children’s Wing.
- Children’s Church is available during the 10:30 AM service. Parents check-in their children in the Narthex or Grace Café. All children begin church with their parents, then leave after the Gospel reading for Children’s Church. They return to the Sanctuary after the Peace. The Toddler room is available for those 4 and under.

Volunteer Needs include:

- *Check-In Volunteer:* Welcomes students & families, checks in students, answers guest questions.
- *Classroom Assistant:* Assists Children's Ministry Director and students with Bible lesson and application activities.
- *Bible Quizzing Teacher:* Instructs children during Sunday School.
- *Nursery Helper:* Loves, rocks, reads to, and plays with babies and toddlers.
- **Time Commitment:** Sundays and Childcare during church events
- **Ministry Contact:** Amy Reese, Children's Ministry Director

Special events are opportunities for discipleship, fellowship, and/or outreach. Events are usually 2-4 hours and offered annually. Volunteers are needed for arts and crafts, planning, preparations, set-up and clean-up.

Daughters of the Holy Cross

- Daughters of the Holy Cross is an order for women who make a solemn vow of prayer, service, study and evangelism. They must attend classes before being inducted. At installation, they receive a special cross that they wear daily.
- The DHC is involved with many church activities, sponsors the White Rose Sisterhood ministry to widows, and visits those in nursing homes and shut-ins.

Education and Discipleship

- Education and Discipleship for men and women is offered on Sunday mornings during the Rectors Forum and seasonally for Lenten and Advent Speaker Series, Fall and Spring Bible studies, Winter Discovery

Class, and other fellowship opportunities.

- The Rector's Forum is held from 9:30 AM–10:15 AM on Sundays in the Fellowship Hall and covers topics related to current events.
- The Advent and Lenten Speaker Series offer an opportunity for food, fellowship and growth, featuring guest speakers/lecturers. Volunteers help with set up/clean up.
- Church-wide Fall & Spring Bible studies offer in-depth dives into books of the Bible. Held Wednesdays evenings in the Fellowship Hall, these feature food, fellowship, teaching and small group discussion. Volunteers help with small group facilitation, plus set up/clean up.
- The Discovery Class teaches parishioners about being Anglican and prepares parishioners to be confirmed, received or reaffirmed by the Bishop during his annual visit.
- **Time Commitment:** Volunteers can offer several hours, depending on the event

The Esther Project

- The Esther Project assists families and individuals during times of unexpected crisis. As Esther 4:14 states, "for such a time as this," we're reminded of God's sovereignty as well as our own part to play in, "bearing one another's burdens" (*Galatians 6:2*).
- The Esther Project serves those in our church community who are struggling to meet basic necessities of housing, car repairs, food expenses, medical bills, utility bills, etc. These needs may be caused by a sudden or ongoing financial stress caused by long-term illnesses, job loss, personal casualties, or other unexpected events. The Esther Project also assists families in our Preschool with educational expenses.
- Generous donations from Saint Luke's parishioners, matching grants from the Church Mouse, support from the St. Luke's Foundation, as well as an established trust fund have supported The Esther Project.
- Requests for assistance are welcome. Each petition for assistance is prayerfully considered. Payments are made directly to the provider (for example, a payment to a doctor's office or to Palmetto Electric) rather than directly to an individual. All information is held in strict confidentiality.

Finance Committee

- The Finance Committee is governed by its own By-Laws that work in tandem with the Church By-Laws.
- The Finance Committee's purpose is to assist the Vestry in carrying out the fiduciary responsibilities of the parish. The scope of the committee includes providing guidance and recommendations regarding financial controls, risk management and fiscal health of the church.
- The Committee also provides financial analysis, advice, and oversight of the church budget, so that programs are operating within financial resources that are available.
- Membership on the committee includes the Rector's Warden, the People's Warden, and the Treasurer of the church, in addition to other voting members that rotate and who are recruited specifically by the Treasurer.
- **Time Commitment:** Monthly meetings as well as time to review and prayerfully consider necessary financial documents

Flower Guild

- *"Grow Flowers of Gratitude in the Soul of Prayer"*. The Flower Guild ministry is one that is fortunate to work with so much beauty within our church and its environment. Volunteers give their time and passion for our parish and to the Glory of God.
- Altar flowers for Sunday services are gathered during the week and arranged for placement on Saturday mornings.
- Parishioners have the opportunity to sponsor flowers in memory of loved ones or for special occasions.
- The Flower Guild also assists with memorial services and receptions in the Fellowship Hall.
- Decorating the church for Christmas and Easter are the largest projects, which require additional hours and volunteers.
- **Time Commitment:** 4-6 hours per week

Greeters

- This is a wonderful way to serve and meet other people!
- Greeters are present at the three church entrances to welcome parishioners and visitors to worship together at our Sunday morning services. There are two teams that serve: 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM.
- Individuals, couples, friends and families, new members, part-timers

and long-timers may fill this role on any given Sunday, or for special occasions such as memorials, Christmas and Holy Week services, and more.

- The main job is to be ready with a smile and welcoming conversation. Warm, friendly encounters create lasting impressions.
- **Time Commitment:** Greeters are scheduled in advance; approx. 20 minutes are needed on Sundays (15 minutes prior and 5 minutes after the service begins)
- **Ministry Contacts:** James Stubs (8:00 AM) and Nancy Henty (10:30 AM)

Hospitality

- Hospitality at Saint Luke's is part of who we are as a parish family. We truly welcome and value all who come, and seek to extend Jesus' hospitality to all who are visiting, exploring, or who are members. We serve not only at coffee hour between worship services but also at funerals/memorials, fellowship events, church-wide Bible studies and speaker series, and more. Joining this ministry is an excellent way to get connected at Saint Luke's.
- Work of the ministry involves: welcoming guests; preparing and arranging food and beverages; placing table settings and décor as needed; moving tables and chairs as needed; emptying trash if needed; performing kitchen set up and clean up; monitoring kitchen inventory, washing tablecloths and upkeep of linen/silver closet; and, coordinating with the Parish Administrator regarding the events on the church calendar.
- **Time Commitment:** Sunday mornings: 1-2 hours per week in rotation; 2-4 hours for special events and occasions

Intercessors

- The Intercessors meet in the Prayer Room weekly at 11:00 AM on Wednesdays just after the 10:00 AM Eucharist Service. New members are welcome!
- Intercessors pray for an hour or more covering our Clergy, Vestry and Staff; our worship services; families, children and students; those with continuing health concerns, in nursing homes or at home with long-term illnesses; specific needs that have been committed to us; those who grieve the loss of loved ones; our missionaries; the Diocesan South Carolina Cycle of Prayer; the Church worldwide; our military and their families; our government leaders; and any other items we feel led to pray for

- Each week we also compile a list of specific requests that are mailed out (USPS or emailed) to our fellow Intercessors
- **Time Commitment:** One hour each Wednesday

Lay Eucharistic Ministry

- The Lay Eucharistic Ministry (LEM) represents the love, care, compassion and prayers of the whole congregation by sharing Christ's Body and Blood to those unable to join Sunday services at Saint Luke's.
- Weekly visits are made to several of the Hilton Head Island elderly care centers and personal visits are made to those homebound.
- The LEM team works closely with our Clergy; team members mentor and train new members.
- Jesus said, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst" (*John 6:35*).
- Please consider joining our ministry; it is truly a joyous experience.
- **Time Commitment:** Sundays and some weekdays to visit and serve—approximate 1-2 hours; participate in LEM annual meeting.

Lay Readers & Chalice Bearers

- Lay Readers and Chalice Bearers share their gift of speech to proclaim the word of God. and gift of service in distributing the Body and Blood of Christ.
- Lay reading is perfect for members of the congregation who have busy schedules who want to be involved in a ministry.
- Scripture is read from the ACNA standard English Standard Version Bible (ESV).
- We have seasonal training sessions so that we were well-equipped and ready to serve.
- In addition to Sunday readings, there are other readings seasonally (e.g., Lessons and Carols and the Passion of our Lord on Palm Sunday)
- New readers and chalice bearers are always welcome!
- It is good to arrive approximately 30 minutes prior to the Sunday services, which allow lay readers to spend time with other ministry members and members of the clergy.
- **Time Commitment:** Schedules are made quarterly and Sunday assignments are made every four to six weeks.

Missions Committee

- The Saint Luke's Missions committee seeks to assist people in the mission field in the spread of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
- Missionaries that are supported may be local, national or international.
- Committee members consider how and to whom funding is disseminated. Funding comes from the church budget, donations from Outreach "Missions" month, the Church Mouse and several other funding sources.
- We currently support approx. seven missionaries as well as other missions organizations on an ongoing basis.
- We host and encourage missionaries to present and speak about their projects to the congregation.
- The committee explores additional ways to support the current missionaries and develops new programs for evangelism. Individuals can be a committee member, chairperson, treasurer or secretary.
- **Time Commitment:** Meetings are held seasonally, based upon any upcoming missions trips.

Music Ministry

There are many ways to join the Music Ministry, which is a vital component of our worship at Saint Luke's. Music is a vehicle for worshiping the triune God--Father, Son and Holy Spirit. At Saint Luke's, we offer both traditional and contemporary music styles. All ages can participate in one or more of the following:

Children & Youth—explore the world of music with songs, instruments, games and movement. Choristers also listen to Bible stories, Scripture, and Christian books. Choirs rehearse weekly and sings songs at specified worship services throughout the year.

- **CANTERBURY CHOIR** (Boys & Girls, 4 - 6-years old) Rehearsals: Wednesdays, 4:15-4:55pm, September through May
- **ST. NICHOLAS CHOIR** (Boys & Girls, Grades 2 - 5) Rehearsals: Wednesdays, 5:00-6:00pm, September through May
- **YOUTH BELLS** (Boys & Girls, Grades 3 & above) Ringers learn music reading skills and develop ringing techniques. Rehearsals: Mondays, 4:00-5:00pm, September through May

Adults & Youth

- **SAINT LUKE'S MUSIC TEAM** (high school through adults) The Music Team provides music for worship at the 10:30 AM service. The Saint

Luke's Music Team is composed of instrumentalists who enjoy using their gifts and talents to, "minister through music." There is a great team spirit reflected each Sunday in the worship.

- If you enjoy singing and/or you can play an instrument, the Team is always looking for new talent
- There's a year-round commitment for Sunday worship services and for special occasions
- Rehearsals: Tuesdays, 6:30–8:00PM, starting September and Sundays, 9:15 AM before 10:30 AM service
- **RING & REJOICE HANDBELLS** Ringing handbells is a team sport! The team develops great friendships, love and concern for each other.
- Music reading is required, but previous ringing experience is not.
- Ringers perform every 6–8 weeks at the 10:30 AM Sunday service and for other special services.
- Rehearsals: Mondays, 5:30–7:00pm, starting in September
- **ST. LUKE'S CHOIR (SATB)** This choir presents large choral works at Christmas and for other special performances.
- Rehearsals: Tuesdays, 5:00–6:30pm, starting in September into the New Year
- **Time Commitment:** For all music teams, rehearsals are held weekly, as well as a commitment to the worship performances on Sundays as scheduled, as well as at other significant events
- **Ministry Contacts:** Nina Rodman, Minister of Music and Dallas Reese, Praise Team Leader

Office Volunteers

- Our Office Volunteers support the Clergy and Parish Administrator by filling the role of receptionist in the front Church Office. Volunteers take phone calls, pick up mail, and assist the Parish Administrator with weekly projects (organizing, copying, printing, typing, sorting, compiling, etc.).
- Part of the job requires an ability to be friendly and welcoming to all who enter the Church Office. Excellent customer service is paramount and polite, professional, and discreet decorum is expected.
- In addition, Office Volunteers should possess basic office skills, such as a familiarity with phones and computers, as well as other essential administrative tasks.
- **Time Commitment:** Regular volunteers commit to one (or more) weekly 3.5 hour shifts, from either 9:00 AM–12:30 PM, or 12:30 PM to 4:00 PM, Monday–Thursday. Substitute office volunteers are on call, to be contacted when necessary.

Outreach of the Month Ministry

- The Saint Luke's Outreach of the Month ministry is a means by which Saint Luke's parishioners can "give back" specifically to local charities outside of the church and to organizations within the church that support missions or activities that reach people beyond our own membership (such as the Preschool or ACTS Counseling Center).
- The core of the program involves selection of twelve (or more) Outreach of the Month recipients from a qualified set of applicants (non-profit organizations) and then organize them so that funds can be collected and distributed each month. As a committee member, you will be a liaison between Saint Luke's and the non-profit contact person.
- **Time Commitment:** 7 to 8 monthly meetings throughout the year, hosting a monthly recipient which involves helping the recipient get publications to the Bulletin, and helping them with their presentation (about 2 hours). Duration of ministry commitment is one to two years.

Saint Luke's Foundation

- The Saint Luke's Foundation was formed to assist our parishioners in their giving process. It is a cost effective, efficient way to provide funds to charities and missions that constantly need our help. The Foundation helps facilitate single gift or long-term giving into a long-term benefit for the needy, usually set up as an endowment.
- The Foundation has also awarded scholarships annually to graduating seniors. The Jennifer Mason Memorial Scholarship, the Saint Luke's Foundation Scholarships, along with a generous grant for the Esther Project have been given.
- The Foundation's capital funds are managed by Wells Fargo Advisors. The Foundation Board provides the boundaries and goals of these investments.
- **Time Commitment:** 1-1.5 hours per month for a board meeting; overall duration of role is two years.

Saint Luke's Players Drama Ministry

The Saint Luke's Players was formed as a way to share our congregation's theatrical gifts and talents with each other and with the community.

- The Saint Luke's Players is open to any member of Saint Luke's or the greater community who has the theatre bug to be either onstage or

behind the scenes.

- The Players perform at the BMOC/Preschool Christmas Fundraiser as well as in a dramatic interpretation of The Passion on Palm Sunday.
- The Players have held drama workshops with improvisation and table reads of various comedic and serious scenes and skits.
- **Time Commitment:** Scheduled rehearsals on Saturday mornings and at other times as needed

Saint Luke's Preschool

- Saint Luke's Preschool is a Christian and State-Registered preschool, operating under the auspices of Saint Luke's Anglican Church of Hill-ton Head.

Student Fellowship Ministry

Our Student Ministry is committed to Acts 2:42 which states, “they were devoted to the apostles’ teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers,” so that Students may, “Know Christ and Make Him Known.”

- The Vision for the Student Ministry at Saint Luke’s is that when a student graduates from High School, they are a committed disciple of Jesus Christ, confirmed in the Anglican tradition. - Four core areas of Student Ministry include:

 - * **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION** (Proverbs 22:6), through catechesis, confirmation courses, and Bible studies; and,
 - * **DISCIPLESHIP** (Matthew 28:19–20) by the means of Youth Group and small group discussion.
- Youth Group, or **FELLOWSHIP** is held Sunday evenings, 5:30 PM – 7:00 PM in the M&M Building. Dinner is provided. The purpose of FELLOWSHIP is to nurture the faith of our Students as they grow in the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ.
- Other events and activities that Students can participate in include: the Rector’s Forum on Sunday mornings at 9:15AM, which is a weekly discussion for adults and teenagers, led by The Revd. Dr. Jady Koch, regarding current events as they
- relate to the Church.; Bible Study Series (Fall & Spring); Diocesan Retreats (Mondo and Regenerate); Community Service Projects; Fat Tuesday Pancake Fundraiser; and Summer Mission Trips (TBD).
