



Welcome to Worship

PROCESSION

The music at the beginning of the service accompanies the gathering of the people and the entrance of the ministers, but more importantly it sets the tone for the liturgy and leads us towards reverence, awe, and adoration before Almighty God.

ACCLAMATION

The liturgy begins with the Acclamation, which is an eager expression of praise.

Collect For Purity

In the Collect for Purity, we ask God to cleanse our hearts and minds of anything that comes between Him and us, anything that would impede our worship of Him.

GLORIA

"Since the 4th c., the Gloria has been associated with morning prayers. In Rome, it became part of the Eucharistic Liturgy gradually, so that by the 12th c., a custom had developed of adding it on Sundays, but not during Advent and Lent. Its purpose was to introduce the Liturgy of the Word. It consists of a series of acclamations, a doxological and hymnodic form characteristic of the ancient Greek liturgies." 

Collect Of The Day

The Collects are prayers that touch on the theme of the Scripture readings and transition us from speaking and singing God's praise to listening to his Holy Scriptures.

The Liturgy of the Word

Liturgy of the Word

This portion of the liturgy is known as the Liturgy of the Word. It consists of Scripture readings, the sermon, the Creed, and the Prayers of the People. Anglican worship is built upon the trustworthy foundation of the Bible. We read it, pray it, and sing it. During the Liturgy of the Word, we read selected lessons from the Old Testament, Psalms, New Testament, and Gospel coming from our threeyear Sunday lectionary cycle. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions as the lens through which we read the rest of Scripture.

ESV Bible page 720 THE OLD TESTAMENT READING Isaiah 45:11-13,18-25 ¹¹Thus says the LORD, the Holy One of Israel, and the one who formed him: "Ask me of things to come; will you command me concerning my children and the work of my hands? ¹²I made the earth and created man on it; it was my hands that stretched out the heavens, and I commanded all their host. ¹³ I have stirred him up in righteousness, and I will make all his ways level; he shall build my city and set my exiles free, not for price or reward," says the LORD of hosts. ¹⁸ For thus says the LORD, who created the heavens (he is God!), who formed the earth and made it (he established it; he did not create it empty, he formed it to be inhabited!): "I am the LORD, and there is no other. ¹⁹ I did not speak in secret, in a land of darkness; I did not say to the offspring of Jacob, 'Seek me in vain.' I the LORD speak the truth; I declare what is right. 20 "Assemble yourselves and come; draw near together, you survivors of the nations! They have no knowledge who carry about their wooden idols, and keep on praying to a god that cannot save. ²¹ Declare and present your case; let them take counsel together! Who told this long ago? Who declared it of old? Was it not I, the LORD? And there is no other god besides me, a righteous God and a Savior; there is none besides me. 22 "Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other. ²³ By myself I have sworn; from my mouth has gone out in righteousness a word that shall not return: 'To me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear allegiance.' ²⁴ "Only in the LORD, it shall be said of me, are righteousness and strength; to him shall come and be ashamed all who were incensed against him. ²⁵ In the LORD all the offspring of Israel shall be justified and shall glory."

PSALMS

The Psalms have been the hymnbook of God's people for almost 3,000 years, and they form the backbone of our worship as the Church today. The oldest psalm, Psalm 90, was written by Moses in approximately 1500 BC. They were written to be sung, and the Church sings them in many different forms.

GOSPEL

We stand for the proclamation of the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ, signifying the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions, the lens through which we read all of Scripture. We turn and face the Gospel Book as it is carried. This reminds us that Christ came to dwell among us.

NICENE CREED

We say and pray the Nicene Creed together as a trustworthy summary of the message of the Gospel and as a corporate declaration of the faith that has been handed down to us from the early Church. It was born of rigorous intellectual debate regarding the nature of the Trinity in the 4th c., culminating in councils of the whole church at Nicaea in 325AD and at Constantinople in 381AD. The word "creed" comes from the Latin word "credo" which means "I believe."

that God has for us. God is love, and whoever abides in love abides in God and God abides in him. ¹⁷ By this is love perfected with us, so that we may have confidence for the day of judgment, because as he is so also are we in this world. ¹⁸ There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear. For fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not been perfected in love. ¹⁹ We love because he first loved us. ²⁰ If anyone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for he who does not love his brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen. ²¹ And this commandment we have from him: whoever loves God must also love his brother.

THE NICENE CREED (BCP page 108)

Celebrant and People:

We believe in one God, The Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, visible and invisible.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.
For us and for our salvation, he came down from heaven,
was incarnate from the Holy Spirit, and the Virgin Mary, and was made man.
For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;
he suffered death and was buried.
On the third day he rose again, in accordance with the Scriptures;
he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father.
He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead,
and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE (BCP page 110)

Reader: Let us pray for the Church and for the world, saying, "Hear our prayer."Lay reader prays for each petition, in which the congregation responds accordingly:Reader:Lord, in your mercy:People:Hear our prayer.

The Celebrant concludes with the appropriate Collect.

THE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION OF SIN (BCP page 112)

(Please kneel)

Celebrant: Let us humbly confess our sins to Almighty God.

Celebrant and People:

Almighty God, Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, maker and judge of us all: We acknowledge and lament our many sins and offenses, which we have committed by thought, word, and deed against your divine majesty, provoking most justly your righteous anger against us. We are deeply sorry for these our transgressions; the burden of them is more than we can bear. Have mercy upon us, Have mercy upon us, most merciful Father; for your Son our Lord Jesus Christ's sake, CONFESSION

We're all sinful people. Here, in the Confession of Sin, we admit our sin. Both individually and corporately, we lay our sins at the foot of the Cross, and we take hold of the promise that if we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9).

Comfortable Words

These verses are comforting in that they give us the strength to believe that we are forgiven. The Comfortable Words come directly from Thomas Cranmer's first Anglican Book of Common Praver of 1549 and were brought into the liturgy through German Lutheran influence.

OFFERTORY

Our tithes and offerings are an essential part of Eucharistic worship. Here we give back to God a portion of everything He has given us. Everything we have is His, and we are stewards of His gifts. At the presentation of the offerings, we sing the Doxology (from the Greek doxa logoi, "words of glory"). This is a hymn of praise to God in Trinitarian form.

THE COMFORTABLE WORDS (BCP page 113)

Celebrant: Hear the Word of God to all who truly turn to him.

- * God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life. *John 3:16*





LITURGY OF THE TABLE

The Liturgy of the Table is called The Eucharist or The Holy Communion. The word Eucharist comes from a Greek word which means "thanksgiving." It is at this point that our attention should turn from the pulpit and lectern to the Celebrant at the Lord's Table.

The Holy Communion

Prayer of Consecration

The Holy Communion, the Supper of the Lord, is not only a sign of the love that Christians ought to have among themselves for each other but is especially a sacrament of our redemption by Christ's death. The Eucharistic Prayer is centered in the atoning death of Jesus Christ upon the cross. His suffering there in our place is the only sufficient ground or basis for our standing before God. Our joy in the present and our

from the reality of God's redeeming work
in the historic event of the crucifixion.

THE SURSUM CORDA (BCP page 115) The People remain standing.



Please kneel.

Celebrant:

All praise and glory is yours, O God our heavenly Father, for in your tender mercy, you gave your only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption. He made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and he instituted, and in his Holy Gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again. So now, O merciful Father, in your great goodness, we ask you to bless and sanctify, with your Word and Holy Spirit, these gifts of bread and wine, that we, receiving them according to your Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

For on the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

Therefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of your dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we your humble servants celebrate and make here before your divine Majesty, with these holy gifts, the memorial your Son commanded us to make; remembering his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and his promise to come again.

And we earnestly desire your fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this, our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; asking you to grant that, by the merits and death of your Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his Blood, we and your whole Church may obtain forgiveness of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present to you, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice. We humbly pray that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ, be filled with your grace and heavenly benediction, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, because of our many sins, to offer you any sacrifice, yet we ask you to accept this duty and service we owe, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE LORD'S PRAYER (BCP page 118)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Jesus gave this prayer to His disciples as an example of how to pray. It has been part of Eucharistic liturgies since the 4th c.

In the Lord's Prayer, we ask for daily bread, or the things we need to get through each day, but we also ask our Lord to give us of Himself, the true Bread of Life.

PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS

The Prayer of Humble Access is a distinctive element of worship in the Anglican Tradition. Assembled by Thomas Cranmer, it includes phrases and concepts from Mark 7:28, the Liturgy of St. Basil, a Gregorian collect, John 6:56, and the theology of Martin Luther and Thomas Aquinas.

As we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.


Celebrant:Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.People:Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!

THE PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS (BCP page 119)

Celebrant and People:

We do not presume to come to this your table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your abundant and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table; but you are the same Lord whose character is always to have mercy. Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

THE MINISTRATION OF COMMUNION (BCP page 120)

Celebrant:

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

(All baptized and believing Christians are invited to share Holy Communion. All who desire a blessing may come forward to the altar rail with your hands crossing your chest. Please inform an usher if you require a gluten free wafer.)

Agnus Dei

The Agnus Dei is based on John 1:29 and is the Fraction Anthem most traditionally used in the Western Church.

Post Communion Prayer

We give thanks for the spiritual nourishment we have just received and seek God's help for the Christian service He has put before us. The members of the congregation are then sent into the world as witnesses of Christ.

THE POST COMMUNION PRAYER (BCP page 120)

After Communion, the *Celebrant* says: Let us pray.

Almighty and ever living God, we thank you for feeding us, in these holy mysteries, with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; and for assuring us, through this Sacrament, of your favor and goodness towards us: that we are true members of the mystical body of your Son, the blessed company of all faithful people; and are also heirs, through hope, of your everlasting kingdom. And we humbly ask you, heavenly Father, to assist us with your grace, that we may continue in that holy fellowship, and do all the good works that you have prepared for us to walk in; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

THE BLESSING (BCP page 121)

The Celebrant says:

The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**


DISMISSAL


