WELCOME TO WORSHIP

PROCESSIONAL

The music at the beginning of the service accompanies the gathering of the people and the entrance of the ministers, but more importantly it sets the tone for the liturgy and leads us towards reverence, awe, and adoration before Almighty God.

ACCLAMATION

The liturgy begins with the Acclamation, which is an eager expression of praise.

COLLECT FOR PURITY

In the Collect for Purity, we ask God to cleanse our hearts and minds of anything that comes between Him and us, anything that would impede our worship of Him. Here we

SUMMARY OF THE LAW

These words of Christ bring to our attention the perfect standard of God's righteousness and what He requires of us. Both The Summary of the Law and The Decalogue (Ten Commandment s) are options for this movement of the liturgy. The Summary was first used in place of The Decalogue in 1718.

THE ACCLAMATION (BCP page 105)

Celebrant: Blessed be God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

People And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.

THE COLLECT FOR PURITY (BCP page 106)

Celebrant and People:

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

THE SUMMARY OF THE LAW (BCP page 106)

Celebrant: Hear what our Lord Jesus Christ says:

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.



THE COLLECT OF THE DAY (BCP page 617)

Let your merciful ears, O Lord, be open to the prayers of your humble servants; and, that we may receive what we ask, teach us by your Holy Spirit to ask only those things that are pleasing to you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who with you and the same Spirit lives and reigns for ever and ever. **Amen.**

KYRIE

The words "Kyrie Eleison Christe Eleison" come from the Greek and mean, "Lord, Have mercy, Christ, Have Mercy." Within the liturgy, this exclamation lifts our voices in a prayer by which we come before the Mercy Seat of our Lord, asking for the compassion of Christ after the declaration of the Summary of the Law, which has held up the standard of God's righteousness.

COLLECT OF THE DAY

The Collects are prayers that touch on the theme of the Scripture readings and transition us from speaking and singing God's praise to listening to his Holy Scriptures.

LITURGY OF THE WORD

This portion of the liturgy is known as the Liturgy of the Word. It consists of Scripture readings, the sermon, the Creed, and the Prayers of the People. Anglican worship is built upon the trustworthy foundation of the Bible. We read it, pray it, and sing it. During the Liturgy of the Word, we read selected lessons from the Old Testament, Psalms, New Testament, and Gospel coming from our threeyear Sunday lectionary cycle. We stand for the Gospel reading to show the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions as the lens through which we read the rest of Scripture.

The Liturgy of the Word

THE OLD TESTAMENT READING Amos 7:7-15

ESV Bible page 914

⁷ This is what he showed me: behold, the Lord was standing beside a wall built with a plumb line, with a plumb line in his hand. ⁸ And the LORD said to me, "Amos, what do you see?" And I said, "A plumb line." Then the Lord said, "Behold, I am setting a plumb line in the midst of my people Israel; I will never again pass by them; ⁹ the high places of Isaac shall be made desolate, and the sanctuaries of Israel shall be laid waste, and I will rise against the house of Jeroboam with the sword." ¹⁰ Then Amaziah the priest of Bethel sent to Jeroboam king of Israel, saying, "Amos has conspired against you in the midst of the house of Israel. The land is not able to bear all his words. ¹¹ For thus Amos has said, "Jeroboam shall die by the sword, and Israel must go into exile away from his land." ¹² And Amaziah said to Amos, "O seer, go, flee away to the land of Judah, and eat bread there, and prophesy there, ¹³ but never again prophesy at Bethel, for it is the king's sanctuary, and it is a temple of the kingdom." ¹⁴ Then Amos answered and said to Amaziah, "I was no prophet, nor a prophet's son, but I was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore figs. ¹⁵ But the LORD took me from following the flock, and the LORD said to me, 'Go, prophesy to my people Israel.'

Reader: The Word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.

¹ Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, To the saints who are in Ephesus, and are faithful in Christ Jesus: ² Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. ³ Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, 4 even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. In love 5 he predestined us for adoption to himself as sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, 6 to the praise of his glorious grace, with which he has blessed us in the Beloved. 7In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace, 8 which he lavished upon us, in all wisdom and insight 9 making known to us the mystery of his will, according to his purpose, which he set forth in Christ 10 as a plan for the fullness of time, to unite all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. ¹¹ In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will, 12 so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory. ¹³ In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory.

THE GOSPEL READING

Mark 6:7-13

ESV Bible page 1000

Celebrant: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to St. Mark.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

⁷ And he called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸ He charged them to take nothing for their journey except a staff—no bread, no bag, no money in their belts— ⁹ but to wear sandals and not put on two tunics. ¹⁰ And he said to them, "Whenever you enter a house, stay there until you depart from there. ¹¹ And if any place will not receive you and they will not listen to you, when you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." ¹² So they went out and proclaimed that people should repent. ¹³ And they cast out many demons and anointed with oil many who were sick and healed them.

Celebrant: The Gospel of the Lord.

People: Praise to you, Lord Christ.

THE SERMON

The Ven. Dr. Kelly O'Lear

GOSPEL

We stand for proclamation of the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus Christ, signifying the importance we place on Jesus' words and actions, the lens through which we read all of Scripture. We turn and face the Gospel Book as it is carried. This reminds us that Christ came to dwell among us.

NICENE CREED

We say and pray the Nicene Creed together as a trustworthy summary of the message of the Gospel and as a corporate declaration of the faith that has been handed down to us from the early Church. It was born of rigorous intellectual debate regarding the nature of the Trinitv in the 4th c., culminating in councils of the whole church at Nicaea in 325AD and at Constantinople in 381AD. The word "creed" comes from the Latin word "credo" which means "I believe."

THE NICENE CREED (BCP page 108)

Let us confess our faith in the words of the Nicene Creed:

Celebrant and People:

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, visible and invisible.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made.

For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary, and was made man.

For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate;

he suffered death and was buried.

On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshiped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church.

We acknowledge one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins.

We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE (BCP page 110)

Reader: Let us pray for the Church and for the world, saying, "Hear our prayer."

Lay reader prays for each petition, in which the congregation responds accordingly:

Reader: Lord, in your mercy:

People: Hear our prayer.

The Celebrant concludes with the appropriate Collect.

THE CONFESSION AND ABSOLUTION OF SIN (Please kneel) (BCP page 112)

Let us humbly confess our sins to Almighty God.

Celebrant and People:

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who in his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who sincerely repent and with true faith turn to him, have mercy

upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Priest, stands and says

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, who in his great mercy has promised forgiveness of sins to all those who sincerely repent and with true faith turn to him, have mercy upon you, pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and bring you to everlasting life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

THE COMFORTABLE WORDS (BCP page 113)

Celebrant: Hear the Word of God to all who truly turn to him.





THE COMFORTABLE WORDS

These verses of Scripture following the Absolution serve as a seal of assurance that for those who are truly penitent, the Lord has put away their sins. They are comforting in that they give us the strength to believe that we are forgiven. The Comfortable Words come directly from Thomas Cranmer's first Anglican Book of Common Prayer of 1549 and were brought into the liturgy through German Lutheran influence.

OFFERTORY


Our tithes and offerings are an essential part of Eucharistic worship. Here we give back to God a portion of everything He has given us. Everything we have is His, and we are stewards of His gifts. At the presentation of the offerings, we often sing a Doxology (from the Greek doxa logoi, "words of glory"). This is a hymn of praise to God in Trinitarian form.



THE PRAYER OF CONSECRATION (BCP page 116)

Please kneel.

Celebrant: All praise and glory is yours, O God our heavenly Father, for in your tender mercy, you gave your only Son Jesus Christ to suffer death upon the Cross for our redemption. He made there, by his one oblation of himself once offered, a full, perfect, and sufficient sacrifice, oblation, and satisfaction, for the sins of the whole world; and he instituted, and in his Holy Gospel commanded us to continue, a perpetual memory of his precious death and sacrifice, until his coming again. So now, O merciful Father, in your great goodness, we ask you to bless and sanctify, with your Word and Holy Spirit, these gifts of bread and wine, that we, receiving them according to your Son our Savior Jesus Christ's holy institution, in remembrance of his death and passion, may be partakers of his most blessed Body and Blood.

PRAYER OF CONSECRATION

The Holy Communion, the Supper of the Lord, is not only a sign of the love that Christians ought to have among themselves for each other but is especially a sacrament of our redemption by Christ's death. The Eucharistic Prayer is centered in the atoning death of Jesus Christ upon the cross. His suffering there in our place is the only sufficient ground or basis for our standing before God. Our joy in the present and our hope for the future all flow from the reality of God's redeeming work in the historic event of the crucifixion.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Jesus gave this prayer to His disciples as an example of how to pray. It has been part of Eucharistic liturgies since the 4th c.

In the Lord's Prayer, we ask for daily bread, or the things we need to get through each day, but we also ask our Lord to give us of Himself, the true Bread of Life.

AGNUS DEI

The Agnus Dei is based on John 1:29 and is the Fraction Anthem most traditionally used in the Western Church.

For on the night that he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take, eat; this is my Body, which is given for you: Do this in remembrance of me."

Likewise, after supper, Jesus took the cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink this, all of you; for this is my Blood of the New Covenant, which is shed for you, and for many, for the forgiveness of sins: Whenever you drink it, do this in remembrance of me."

Therefore, O Lord and heavenly Father, according to the institution of your dearly beloved Son our Savior Jesus Christ, we your humble servants celebrate and make here before your divine Majesty, with these holy gifts, the memorial your Son commanded us to make; remembering his blessed passion and precious death, his mighty resurrection and glorious ascension, and his promise to come again.

And we earnestly desire your fatherly goodness mercifully to accept this, our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving; asking you to grant that, by the merits and death of your Son Jesus Christ, and through faith in his Blood, we and your whole Church may obtain forgiveness of our sins, and all other benefits of his passion.

And here we offer and present to you, O Lord, ourselves, our souls and bodies, to be a reasonable, holy, and living sacrifice. We humbly pray that all who partake of this Holy Communion may worthily receive the most precious Body and Blood of your Son Jesus Christ, be filled with your grace and heavenly benediction, and be made one body with him, that he may dwell in us, and we in him.

And although we are unworthy, because of our many sins, to offer you any sacrifice, yet we ask you to accept this duty and service we owe, not weighing our merits, but pardoning our offenses, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **Amen.**

THE LORD'S PRAYER (BCP page 118)

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

Give us this day our daily bread.

And forgive us our trespasses,

As we forgive those who trespass against us.

And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory,

for ever and ever. Amen.

THE FRACTION (BCP page 118)

Celebrant: Alleluia! Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.


People: Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia!

Celebrant and People:

We do not presume to come to this your table, O merciful Lord, trusting in our own righteousness, but in your abundant and great mercies. We are not worthy so much as to gather up the crumbs under your table; but you are the same Lord whose character is always to have mercy. Grant us, therefore, gracious Lord, so to eat the flesh of your dear Son Jesus Christ, and to drink his blood, that our sinful bodies may be made clean by his body, and our souls washed through his most precious blood, and that we may evermore dwell in him, and he in us. Amen.

THE MINISTRATION OF COMMUNION (BCP page 120)

Celebrant:

The gifts of God for the people of God. Take them in remembrance that Christ died for you and feed on him in your hearts by faith, with thanksgiving.

(All baptized and believing Christians are invited to share Holy Communion. All who desire a blessing may come forward to the altar rail with your hands crossing your chest. Please inform an usher if you require a gluten free wafer.)

THE POST COMMUNION PRAYER (BCP page 120)

After Communion, the *Celebrant* says: Let us pray.

Almighty and ever living God, we thank you for feeding us, in these holy mysteries, with the spiritual food of the most precious Body and Blood of your Son our Savior Jesus Christ; and for assuring us, through this Sacrament, of your favor and goodness towards us: that we are true members of the mystical body of your Son, the blessed company of all faithful people; and are also heirs, through hope, of your everlasting kingdom. And we humbly ask you, heavenly Father, to assist us with your grace, that we may continue in that holy fellowship, and do all the good works that you have prepared for us to walk in; through Jesus Christ our Lord, to whom, with you and the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. Amen.

PRAYER OF HUMBLE ACCESS

The Prayer of Humble Access is a distinctive element of worship in the Anglican Tradition. Assembled by Thomas Cranmer, it includes phrases and concepts from Mark 7:28, the Liturgy of St. Basil, a Gregorian collect, John 6:56, and the theology of Martin Luther and Thomas Aquinas.

POST COMMUNION PRAYER

We giaaaaave thanks for the spiritual nourishment we have just received and seek God's help for the Christian service He has put before us. The members of the congregation are then sent into the world as witnesses of

BLESSING

At the end of the service, the Clergy blesses the family of God as a father blesses his children (Genesis 27; 49). Blessings are generally made up of references to Scripture and the Trinity. Here we are reminded through the blessing that we belong to the Lord and all our good comes from Him.

DISMISSAL

The Dismissal is not a simple adjournment; it is a charge and encouragement to take the Gospel message and an attitude of worship into the world.

THE BLESSING (BCP page 121)

The Celebrant says:

The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son Jesus Christ our Lord; and the blessing of God Almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**
